

Dr. Paul Pimsleur devoted his life to language teaching and testing and was one of the world's leading experts in applied linguistics. After years of experience and research, Dr. Pimsleur developed The Pimsleur Method based on two key principles: the Principle of Anticipation and a scientific principle of memory training that he called "Graduated Interval Recall." This Method has been applied to the many levels and languages of the Pimsleur Programs.

I've struggled for years to become fluent in Russian. I've tried various things to help build my vocabulary, improve my grammar and reduce my accent: purchased many books, a few software packages (including Rosetta Stone), took a university course, watched Russian movies with subtitles, etc. Currently I go to a private tutor 1-2 times per week in addition to studying at home. Out of everything I've tried, this audio course has worked the best for me. If anyone starting Russian were to ask me what I recommend to begin with, this would be it. Don't get your hopes too high and expect to be speaking fluent, conversational Russian by the end of this course. I used to believe the advertisements that claim there is a "fast and easy way to learn a new language", but now I know there is no such thing. It takes a lot of practice, and I suppose "fast" is a relative term. What I would say you can expect of this course is an introduction to some common conversational topics, and a the ability to respond to them very clearly (with minimal accent). This course will only aid you in learning Russian, it won't come close to teaching you everything you need. This audio course has an English speaking instructor, and a Russian speaking man and woman. The instructor essentially translates for you and explains how the grammar works, and you are expected to listen, repeat, and respond. You are often thrown into a conversation where you are expected to respond correctly. The Russian speakers talk very fast, which was jarring to me at first. With most of my language lessons the speakers go very slowly, making it easy for me to absorb everything. However, when you get trained to hear those words slowly and it makes it difficult for you to catch them in a real

conversation later. In my opinion it is much better practice to hear the language as native speakers would actually use it. The Russian guy in this audio talks so fast that it sounds like he is racing for his life sometimes. It was very frustrating to me at first, but eventually I was able to start catching everything he is saying. Like I said, this is great practice for the real thing. You get very little time to respond to conversations, and I realized that I don't have enough time to process my response in English before saying it in Russian. I have to understand the conversation in Russian and immediately know how to respond in Russian. It has truly gotten me to start thinking in Russian. The lessons are each 30 minutes long, and it is recommended that you only ever do one per day. That is up to you I suppose, I will sometimes do a lesson in the morning and another in the evening. My one complaint about this course is that there is no text to go along with it. I end up taking notes on the side when I hear words I'm not familiar with, and reviewing that list of vocabulary and phrases is very helpful to me.

I had this on cassettes and was so happy to find it in cd form. It has helped me communicate with a Russian friend I have even though she speaks english pretty well. To be able speak with someone who knows the language is very helpful with pronunciation. Even though I am not fluent she can understand what I am trying to say and the cds have helped. This is an excellent product for those of us who need to hear things repeated to grasp it. And I want to say that the seller was excellent in that they let me know that they offered higher levels when this level was accomplished and send extra material for me to look at which was greatly appreciated. I am very happy with the purchase and seller.

My last experience with Pimsleur was a 1993 edition of Ukrainian. It was an effective lesson plan (30 lessons) and I learned sufficiently to successfully visit. I prefer the format of the new course. More time is spent working within conversational contexts as the vocabulary is built whereas the older plan kept most of the heavily involved conversations reserved for the last few tapes. My previous experience with the Pimsleur method was so positive and enjoyable that when I decided to take up conversational Russian their Russian I was my first choice.

This full 30-lesson course is GREAT!!!! I bought the little trial copy (\$15 for 10 lessons) first, and found their method much better than any other language course on audiobook I'd seen. So I splurged on the full 30-lesson set, which I am really enjoying. They are slow-paced and do not require you to look at anything, so it's perfect for using while you drive. My commute is only 20

minutes a day, and I can get in a lesson and a half. If I had any complaint, it would be that they repeat words and phrases more than necessary. If you're like me and want to really get everything well, you'll play each lesson 2-3 times anyway, so they don't need to repeat themselves quite so much. But it's a minor point and won't stop you from really grasping pronunciation and grammar, for which these guys are really strong.

I love this so far. I am only a bit over half-way through Russian I and I feel I am learning a lot. I'm taking my sweet time with it though, as I want to ensure I absorb as much of the language as possible (both listening and speaking). I tend to listen to each lesson 3 or 4 times (many people have commented that they only do it once or twice ... but I think I need the 'extra' time). I just ordered Russian II, so hopefully I will continue to progress. I know they have a Russian III, but that's as far as Pimsleur Russian goes. Hopefully it will be plenty to give me a good grasp of the language.

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
